But of all the young animals that are abroad in summer, the most easily seen are the moose. Wildlife management policies have banned, licensed or otherwise restricted hunting and fishing in the park and have applied various policies of intervention and conservation to the park's fish and game. A less common way to get into Algonquin is by aeroplane. The park naturalists try to locate a wolf pack the night before and then lead a caravan of cars down the highway to the place where wolves were heard. Since , they have been providing exclusive nature based adventures for students and travelers from all over the world. While there are tons of POIs on each map, some are more interesting than others. When roads were developed across the park, automobile camping and boating facilities were added. Some people use bicycles as well, and some even walk; but this is not recommended. By the area had sawmills and lumber camps from one end to the other. The environmental impact is minimal,when compared to the amount of waste left behind by some less than eco-friendly visitors to the park. The Portage, Two Rivers and Opeongo stores provide camping, canoeing and other outfitting equipment. Dwight, 13 miles west of the park, is another resort center. Its rugged lakeshores and wooded slopes have long attracted many artists and outdoor enthusiasts, fostering intense affection for the park across the province and the nation. By bus[edit] Parkbus offers seasonal express bus service May-October from Toronto and Ottawa directly to campgrounds, lodges, outfitters, trailheads and canoe access points all along the Highway 60 corridor. It is highly recommended that you not drink straight out of the lakes. If driving, there are numerous places where you can leave your car while you enjoy either Algonquin's back country or the Highway 60 corridor front country campgrounds.
